## 9. Entry Requirements

In addition to a portfolio interview indicating an ability to succeed on the programme, students seeking entry to the programme should normally have attained as a minimum one of the following:

- Minimum requirements (students <21 years old):  
200 UCAS Points  
GCSE grade C in English and maths
- Desirable requirements (students <21 years old):  
240+ UCAS Points  
BTEC National Diploma in Photography, an art and design discipline, media or related subject.
- Access Certificate in a related area of study with a minimum of 9 credits at level 3.
- Applications will also be welcomed from those who have other relevant qualifications.
- For applicants aged 21 or over formal entry qualifications may be waived if the applicant has appropriate experience and has satisfactorily demonstrated through portfolio or other evidence at interview that he/she has the capability and commitment to complete the programme of study. Offers to any non-standard applicant will be agreed with the school of Architecture, Design & Construction.

The acquisition of creative skills through the various courses also enhances communication skills. These are required extensively for work-based learning.</p> <p>The Work Based Learning courses in both years of the course include specific opportunities for the acquisition of professional skills. Adequate provision and support is offered to students requiring the ICT skills needed to successfully carry out research, written assignment and PowerPoint presentations. Individual courses will supply appropriate website guidance.</p> <p>Specific numeracy skills are used in the Work Based Learning courses. Students are required to calculate and manage budgets.</p> <p>Group work is an integral part of the programme, and students encounter a range of opportunities to develop interpersonal skills. Group meetings, portfolios and tutorials are used to analyse and evaluate performance.</p> <p>Throughout the programme the focus is on the understanding of the industry and its requirements. A series of extracurricular lectures by visiting professionals takes place throughout both years. Through tutorials students will be set targets and strategies for meeting these identified. The acquisition of a suitable portfolio is addressed primarily within the Work Based Learning courses</p>

**2. Assessment methods:**

Rather than appearing as discreet entities, transferable/key skills, particularly communication and interpersonal skills, are integrated in all programme assessments. In this way tutors use assessments to reflect the development of specific competences within their respective courses.

This element is primarily developed through the Contextual Studies (level 4) and Critical Studies (level 5) courses and through the self-initiated assignments that form the portfolio content of Concepts in Photography (level 4) and Specialist Photographic Project (level 5)

The fostering of creativity and the development of ideas is central to the programme and is most specifically addressed through the Work Based Learning courses at both level 4 and 5. Students undertake live project work and are supported to bring forward professional and commissioned work as well as portfolio and online presence for assessment.

Through the theme based assignments and tutorial support for the development of self-initiated projects, students are encouraged to challenge their assumptions and consider the needs of varied audiences for images
